Dr Noreen Tehrani

Chair of the Crisis, Disaster and Trauma Psychology Section

British Psychological Society

Noreen is the Chair of the Crisis, Disaster and Trauma Section of the British Psychological Society and has worked with various aspects of trauma for a long time. She was directly involved in dealing with 9/11 and 7/7 terrorist attacks and more recently has worked on the Shoreham air crash, the Westminster and London Bridge terrorist attacks and the Grenfell Tower disaster. She has also supported first responders and victims of a wide range of other traumatic incidents including child abuse, murders, rapes, fatal accidents and road crashes.

Currently she is working with several police forces to reduce the incidence of primary and secondary trauma in police officers and staff involved in working in undercover operations, firearms, road deaths and child abuse.

Noreen has written many articles, papers and book chapters including two books on trauma Workplace Trauma - concepts, assessment and intervention and Managing Trauma in the Workplace.



Prof Paul French

Adult Mental Health Clinical Lead

Greater Manchester and Eastern Cheshire Strategic Clinical Networks

Paul has worked within the NHS since 1986 working within inpatient, community and psychological therapy services, predominantly working with people experiencing psychosis and psychotic related disorders. He completed a PhD in 2007 in psychological factors associated with people at high risk of developing psychosis and was appointed as honorary professor at University of Liverpool in 2014. He is an author of over 50 publications in peer reviewed journals in addition to a number of books, book chapters and reports. Currently Paul is an applicant on a number of NIHR clinical trials with a total grant income of over £7M.

Currently Paul holds a number of regional positions including Clinical Lead for Early Psychosis in the North West for NHSE and holds the position of Clinical Lead for Mental Health for Greater Manchester Strategic Clinical Networks. He is a member of the National Expert Reference Group which developed the clinical implementation guide for the Access and Waiting times standards for Early Psychosis.

Additionally Paul is the Adult Mental Health Lead at the GMEC Strategic Clinical Networks and supports mental health across GM.



Dr Claire Maguire

Claire Maguire is the Clinical and Professional lead for Psychological Therapies at Pennine Care NHS Foundation Trust. Claire is a Consultant Clinical Psychologist and Psychodynamic Psychotherapist with a particular interest in trauma informed services and compassionate care. For over 10 years Claire was also a Health Commissioner with a CCG and worked in a number of Commissioning roles and she is currently a member of the Greater Manchester, Lancashire and South Cumbria Clinical Senate council.

Claire was involved in the development of the Improving access to Psychological Therapies (IAPT) programme for Children and young people and she led on the development of the Specialised Military Veterans Mental Health service that covers Lancashire and Greater Manchester.

Claire has been involved in the development of the Resilience hub and is part of the Greater Manchester wide steering group overseeing the mental health response following the Arena bombing.



Dr Alan Barrett

Dr Alan Barrett is a Consultant Clinical Psychologist and has been the Clinical Lead for England's largest dedicated NHS Military Veterans Psychological Therapies Service since launching in 2011. As an active member of the North West Armed Forces Network, Alan additionally represents the region at the National Military Veterans Mental Health Network, and is also currently a member of the Mental Health sub group for the National Armed Forces Clinical reference group at NHS England, advising on best practice on the mental health care of serving and ex-military personnel.

Alan is passionate about normalising psychological reactions to abnormal events. Using his knowledge of the psychological impact of IED's, he was instrumental in establishing The Manchester Resilience Hub, where he also works as the Adult Clinical lead. The Hub was established to coordinate the NHS response to victims of the Manchester Arena Attack, and has supported over 2500 individuals to date.



Dr Paul Campbell

Paul was born and raised in Belfast, Northern Ireland during "The Troubles". In his early career he worked as a researcher carrying out research into the psychological trauma caused by The Troubles. He moved to England in 2003 to train as a Clinical Psychologist and since qualifying has been working for the 5 Boroughs Partnership (now North West Boroughs Healthcare) NHS Foundation Trust in Primary Care Mental Health Services.

He is currently the Clinical Lead for all Adult IAPT Services provided by this Trust as well as being the Clinical Lead for Adult IAPT for the Greater Manchester & Eastern Cheshire Strategic Clinical Network. He also provides consultation on service delivery and achieving recovery rates for IAPT services.

Having trained as a nurse, Neil's worked in London, India and Manchester, predominantly in respiratory medicine and clinical teaching. 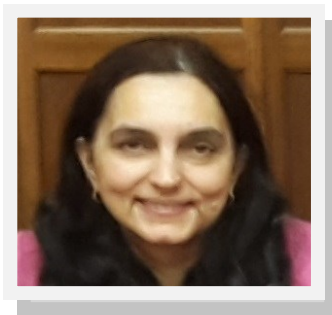
Clare Baguley

She contributes training and conferences on primary care mental health with a particular interest in the use of psychological approaches in physical health care settings.
